Before You File

- Who Should File?¹ Anyone who has taxes withheld from their paycheck
 - By law, dependent students making less than \$6,100/yr. do not have to pay taxes
 - BUT-If taxes are withheld from your paycheck, to not file is to donate to the IRS

• Forms You Need:2

- <u>W-2</u>: You will have a W-2 for every job held in the tax year. If you don't receive one by February, contact your employer
- <u>1098-T</u>: Your college will give you this form containing information needed to claim education credit (tution paid, grants/scholarships, and adjustments from last year).
- <u>1098-E</u>: You will get this form from your student loan lender if you paid more than \$600 on interest. Use this form to deduct your paid interest.

When You File

• The 2 Easiest Ways to File:

- Free File: Online software provided by the IRS that makes filing an easy step-by-step process
 - Free to people making less than \$64,000/yr.
- <u>The Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program</u>: IRS-certified volunteers provide free in-person tax return preparation using electronic filing (must make \$54,000/yr. or less)
- Deduct Education Expences -or- Claim Education Tax (not both):
 - Deduct up to \$4,000 of qualifying school expences: tuition, fees, books, and class materials
 - American Opportunity Credit: 5 claim up to 4 times while enrolled as undergrad
 - Must be at least part-time for one semester during the tax year
 - Max of \$2,500 a year, with up to \$1,000 available even if you don't owe any taxes
 - Lifetime Learning Credit: 6 Can claim up to \$2,000 every year you have college expenses
 - No limit to number of years you can claim and no enrollment requirement

Keep in Mind:

- You can only **choose one** of the above options- Deduct expences, or claim ONE education credit
- Tax day is **April 18-** plan ahead and start early to minimize risk of errors.
