TCAT Jacksboro Director Retires

The TCATs celebrate the career and service of TCAT -Jacksboro Director David Browder who retired June 30, 2015. Mr. Browder began his career in education as a middle school teacher and high school coach in Marietta, GA in 1981. He began his service in Tennessee with the Tennessee Board of Regents as the County Supervisor for the Job Training Office at Roane State Community College in 1987. He also served as the Assistant Director for Extended Education at Tennessee Technological University from 1995 to 1997. Browder became the director for the Tennessee College of Applied Technology-Jacksboro in 2002. He served in numerous leadership roles including participating in the first TCAT leadership development program in 2001, member of the



TCAT Directors' Executive Sub-council from 2006-2008 and 2014-2015, as Chairman of the TCAT Leadership Development Program for six years and as Chairman of the Business Systems Technology and Industrial Electricity Technology Curriculum Committees. Browder has the distinction of working in all three divisions of the Tennessee Board of Regents System and retired with 30 years of service in the field of higher education in Tennessee. He is a native of Lenoir City, Tennessee, where he grew up on the Browder Family farm established in Loudon County in 1798. He resides with his wife Melissa and has one son, Sergeant Matthew Browder stationed in Germany. Vice Chancellor James King stated, "Director Browder's experience and commitment will be greatly missed at the TCAT-Jacksboro. His service to his campus and community is appreciated."

TCATs Welcome New Directors

TCATs welcome Mrs. Youlanda Jones-Wilcox as the new director at TCATs-Covington and Ripley. Ms. Jones-Wilcox started on July 1, 2015, and comes to the TCATs with over 14 years of experience in higher education. She began her career in higher education as the Director of Community Education for Dyersburg State Community College in 2001. She served as the Director for UT Martin's Ripley Center from 2005-2011. While at UT Martin, Ms. Jones-Wilcox was instrumental in establishing the first Lauderdale County Dual-Credit Scholarship and assisted in raising over \$300,000 in scholarships and endowments for the Ripley Center. Directly before coming to the TCATs, she served as the Vice President for Institutional Advancement and Continuing Education at Dyersburg State Community College. During her tenure there, she assisted in raising over \$1 million each year in the Dyersburg State Community College Annual Fund Campaign as well as increased contract revenue generation in the Division of Continuing Education and Workforce Development by over 100% and workforce training contact hours by over 300%.



TCATs also welcome Mr. Stephen Milligan as the newest director at TCAT-Crump as of April 1, 2015. He comes to the TCATs with over 18 years of experience in higher education. He began his career in the Tennessee Board of Regents System as the first Director for the Clifton Campus at Columbia State Community College in 1997. While at Columbia State, Mr. Milligan worked to build enrollment and educational programs from the ground up to serve rural Wayne and surrounding counties. He established the College Summit to promote post-secondary education to high school seniors and the Career Summit to increase awareness of job and career opportunities to high school juniors. Mr. Milligan went on to serve as the Assistant Director for TCAT-Pulaski from 2013-2015. During his tenure at TCAT-Pulaski, he coordinated over \$1.4 million in grant funding that allowed the campus to acquire new equipment and start new programs. He served on the LEAP Grant Project Steering Committee to help imple-



ment the South Central LEAP Grant Program, which sought to promote manufacturing careers to secondary and post-secondary students.



Dot Foods Partners with **TCAT-Newbern to Launch Driving School**

Dot Foods and Dot Transportation are partnering with the Tennessee College of Applied Technology-Newbern to offer a unique training opportunity. Dot Transportation donated \$57,000 to the TCAT to offer a 9-week truck driving school at night, with a promise to hire at least 55 graduates of the program. TCAT-Newbern plans to launch the program's first class of eight students on September 7.

TCATs Partner with C-Tech for Industry Certifications

Step into a TCAT classroom and you will see students wiring a network, constructing an automated manufacturing process, troubleshooting and then repairing a faulty fiber optic connection, or more than a hundred other skilled tasks. Today more so than ever before, students are learning processes that will result in employment that extends far beyond entry level. In many cases, our students are also experiencing cutting edge practices in the classroom, and by working alongside professionals during co-op experiences, students gain valuable marketable skills.

Six TCATs have partnered with C-Tech, an educational training company specializing in telecommunications, to give students the opportunity to earn additional industry certifications that make the students even more employable in the workplace. The TCATs

participating in this program are: Athens, Elizabethton, McKenzie, Morristown, Shelbyville, and Whiteville. The results of the C-Tech implementation at the six institutions in Tennessee has been remarkable. Over 98% of the 869 students who have completed the courses in Introduction to Telecommunications, Copper Cabling, Fiber Cabling, Telephone Systems, Home Entertainments, or Energy Management have received a nationally recognized certification in one or more of the six program offerings and earned over 860 industry certifications. Our level of accomplishment exceeds the national average experienced in using C-Tech programs in similar venues. While this speaks volumes about the training aids, it also speaks volumes about the TCAT faculty's ability to effectively present this high tech information.

TCATs know and understand the need to stay ahead of the industry and produce top quality technicians. Our commitment to industry and our students continually propels us to strive not just for a technical diploma but for industry certifications as well.



TCAT-Morristown Receives USDA Rural Development Grant

United States Department of Agriculture Rural Development Area Director, Joe Woody, presented the Tennessee College of Applied Technology-Morristown with a check for \$110,020 to assist with the purchase of state-ofthe-art technology equipment that will be used to train students interested in Advanced Manufacturing. The grant was awarded on July 14, 2015, at a ceremony held at the main campus. In attendance were Morristown mayors Bill Britain (county) and Gary Chesney (city) as well as Mayor Melville Bailey from Hawkins County. Representatives from both Senator Alexander and Senator Corker's staffs were also present at the event.

TCAT-Morristown Director Jerry Patton stated that the grant ties in beautifully with Governor Haslam's "Drive to 55" and the LEAP grant that the community received in the fall of 2014. "Upgrading equipment enables the school to not only train more current students but to heighten the interest of more high school students who may be contemplating careers in business and industry," Patton commented.

The USDA Rural Development is moving investments to rural America with housing, business and infrastructure loans and grants to create jobs and strengthen rural economies. Part of the equipment to be purchased will go to

the school's Hawkins County Branch in Surgoinsville.

Among the items to be purchased are one Process Control Training System; two Precision Surface Grinders; one Pneumatic Trainer; one Hydraulic Trainer; and one Modular Automation Training System.

In addition to training students for entry-level positions in fourteen different areas of study, TCAT-Morristown specializes in upgrading the skills of incumbent workers in our service delivery area. The USDA grant will enable the school to expand the number of companies we currently work with and increase the number of credentials we currently award.


TCAT-Crossville Received **New Electric Car**

Skills National Conference

Once again the Tennessee Colleges of Applied Technology SkillsUSA students represented the Tennessee Board of Regents in exemplary fashion. Over 230 students, advisors, administrators, and business and industry guests from Tennessee Postsecondary SkillsUSA attended the SkillsUSA National Conference in Louisville, KY. Ninety-seven TCAT students from across the state competed in 64 contests with 42 students bringing home gold, silver or bronze medals and 80 finishing in the top ten nationally. Our hardworking delegate team elected our eighth straight National Officer, David Foss II, an HVAC- student from TCAT-Knoxville. In addition, our SkillsUSA chapter from TCAT Harriman was recognized during an awards ceremony at the Kentucky Derby Museum as a Model of Excellence for the Nation for their commitment to community service and developing personal skills of their members.

The SkillsUSA Championships, held in Louisville, KY, took place June 24-25, 2015, as part of the SkillsUSA 51st annual National Leadership and Skills Conference (NLSC), a showcase of career and technical education students. During the week, more than 6,000 outstanding career and technical education students, all state contest winners, competed hands-on in 100 different trade, technical and leadership fields.

During the national competition, students worked against the clock and each other, proving their expertise in occupations like electronics, computer-aided drafting, CNC machining, medical assisting and culinary arts. All contests are run with the help of industry, trade associations, and labor organizations, and test competencies are set by industry. In addition, leadership contestants demonstrated their skills, which included customer service, extemporaneous speaking, quiz bowl and conducting meetings by parliamentary procedure.


Top student winners received gold, silver and bronze medallions. Many also received prizes such as tools of their trade and/or scholarships to further their careers and education. The SkillsUSA Championships is for high school and college-level students who are members of SkillsUSA.

SkillsUSA is a national partnership of students, teachers and industry working together to ensure America has a skilled workforce. SkillsUSA chapters help students who are preparing for careers in technical, skilled and service occupations excel. SkillsUSA has more than 350,000 students and instructors as members.

TCATs Represent at WorldSkills



SkillsUSA, the organization that represents the United States in the WorldSkills Competition, sent 18 career and technical education students to São Paulo, Brazil, to compete in 16 skill categories during the 43rd biennial event on Aug. 11-16, 2015. Over 20 percent of the WorldSkills team was made up of Tennessee College of Applied Technology students this year, with four of the 18 students competing for the United States' team coming from TCATs. Erica Heckman and Daniel Dossett, students from TCAT Knoxville represented the United States in the Manufacturing Team Challenge. This is the first time that the US has competed in this event. Also, TCAT-Chattanooga graduates Ian Gwaltney and James Womble competed in the WorldSkills Mechatronics competition. Not only did this team represent the US and the Tennessee Board of Regents well in competition, they have made national news with articles in the US News and World Report, Huffington Post and others.

The students tested their skills against more than 1,200 students representing 73 countries and regions from around the world competing in 48 official skill competitions and two demonstration contests. There were 5,000 international experts, delegates and judges, 3,000 volunteers and 200,000 student and public spectators in attendance.

The WorldSkills Competition highlights a worldwide issue: preparation of a highly skilled workforce. Simon Field of the Organization for Economic Co-Operation and Development (OECD) stated in the book *Learning for Jobs*, "Increasingly, countries are recognizing that good initial vocational education and training has a major contribution to economic competitiveness. The wealth of nations will come to rely more on the skills of their people than on other sources such as natural resources."

WorldSkills was founded in 1950 and currently has members from 73 countries and regions. In 1973, President Richard M. Nixon recognized SkillsUSA (then known as VICA) as the official U.S. representative to WorldSkills.
